Americans celebrate: Independence Day on the Fourth of July every year. They think of July 4, 1776, as a day that represents the Declaration of Independence and the birth of the United States of America as an independent nation. Fire Works: Because John Adams recommended fire works Before the Declaration of Independence was even signed, he envisioned fireworks as a part of the festivities. ...

The first commemorative Independence Day **fireworks** were set off on **July** 4, 1777.

On **July** 4, 1776, the thirteen colonies claimed their independence from England, an event which eventually led to the formation of the United States. Each year on **July 4th**, also known as Independence Day, Americans celebrate this historic event.

"Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness" is a well-known phrase in the United States Declaration of Independence. The phrase gives three examples of the "unalienable rights" which the Declaration says have been given to all human beings by their Creator, and which governments are created to protect.

**Thomas Jefferson** took the phrase "pursuit of happiness" from **Locke** and incorporated it into his famous statement of a peoples' inalienable right to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness" in the Declaration of Independence.
