BLESSED ARE THOSE WHO MOURN: What do we do. as Christians, on Remembrance Day & All Souls Day? We may remember those who are no longer with us on this side of life, people we knew & loved and miss; we may remember those who died in war. We may honour extraordinary courage and self-sacrifice and mourn tragic sequences of events, cruel and merciless carnage or a staggering blindness that led to folly on a monumental scale. Whatever the experience of our remembering & our mourning, it will doubtless move us deeply whether we are alone, or with others, being silent or joining together in words & music, shedding tears without or within.

The follower of Jesus can never see war as anything but a fruit of failure and tragedy. As a well-known song puts it: the military solution always leads to something worse. War is never a good thing. In some extreme situations it may be a necessary evil. War invariably creates as many problems as it tries to solve, often it creates more. We can never celebrate it or glory in it. It always represents a failure of the ideal, which is peaceful coexistence. Both innocent and guilty are swept up in its turmoil and become victims. Bodies are broken, scarred and maimed, souls are numbed and traumatised and spirits soar either to heights of self-sacrifice and courage or sink to depths of dark, demonic brutality. This means that mourning invites us to take a prophetic stance against the cultural and economic dynamics that rely on and exploit war. It calls us to challenge politics of hate and oppression.

It calls us to expose the lie that creates an enemy "over there" in order to absolve us from facing our own darkness & problems "over here".

So we mourn and we pray for all the departed and especially for those who lost their lives as a result of war. We are united with the whole of humanity in creation, in sin and death, and united with humanity in redemption and resurrection. Our trust & confidence is based on God's love: When I am lifted up from the earth, says Jesus, I shall draw all people to myself (John); God has imprisoned all people in their disobedience only to have mercy on all people (Romans 11).

Sin and death are God's enemies and our enemies and God wants to do away with their destructive power. God has done this by taking away the "sting" of death which is the power of sin to separate us from God. God reconciled us while we were still enemies. So the experience of death is transformed. It no longer symbolises separation from God but now, in Christ, it becomes the path to eternal life.

This is why we have to pray according to God's possibilities not according to our own impossibilities. That is why the Spirit comes to help us in our weakness. So our prayer is not our own it is the prayer of the Spirit praying within us. The Spirit yearns for the revealing of God's children. The Spirit intercedes according to the mind of God. It is an expression of the eternal desire of God to unite all things in peace (cfr Eph 1; Col 1). We can no more refuse to pray than we can refuse to let God's love flow through us. Just as we have no excuse for withholding God's love from anyone, we have no excuse for blocking the desire of God for them, which is the prayer of the Spirit. The Spirit prays that all will be alive to God (Luke 20:37) (DMA)

HEALTH & SAFETY NOTICES:

Accidents on church premises: If you have an accident on church premises please enter the details as soon as possible in the Accident Book located in each sacristy. This is required by the Diocese and the Diocesan Insurers.

First Aid boxes: The first Aid boxes can be found:

OLSJ: There is a first aid box in the Sacristy and one in the Jackie Griffiths room in Joseph's place.

St Anne's: There is a first aid box in the Sacristy and one in the

St Francis: There is a first aid box in the Sacristy.

In case of sudden onset of vomiting, as with the Norovirus, there is a spillage clean up kit in the Sacristy at OLSJ, in the Sacristy at St Anne's & in the porch at St Francis.

Fire Wardens: The Diocese has instructed that every church is obliged to have a fire drill at least once a year. This will **not** be announced beforehand as it is a drill especially for Fire wardens to put what they have learnt into practise. It will happen sometime between now and April! The Fire wardens are very noticeable as they all have Hi-Viz jackets. The emergency evacuation plan is not just in case of fire. It is also in place 'if your lives are threatened by an intruder'. So, when the alarm sounds please treat it seriously and listen to the instructions given by the Fire wardens. They will guide you to a place of safety. It could save your life in a real emergency.
