WE WILL REMEMBER THEM



Remembrance Sunday in the United Kingdom also referred to as Poppy Day or Armistice Day, honours the heroic efforts, achievements and sacrifices that were made in past wars by our wartime heroes and heroines while serving their country. The main observance is on the second Sunday in November, but 2 minutes of silence is also made on November 11. People stop work to observe a moment of silence at 11am on November 11, which is the time and date when hostilities formally ended after more than four years of battle during World War I. Poppies are worn as a symbol of respect and tribute on Remembrance Sunday and/or November 11. The day is also marked by events such as memorial services, church services and parades. A national commemoration takes place at Whitehall, a road in the City of Westminster in central London. Remembrance Day is an observance and not a public holiday in the UK. Many businesses may temporarily pause activity at 11am for 2 minutes of silence on November 11.

By recalling the fortitude of these service men and women, we come to a greater appreciation of what service itself means. We appreciate that those soldiers, sailors and airmen were not just fighting for their country, they were fighting for our freedom and our future. It is service that connects all our Armed Forces past, present and future.

So today, as we come together as a nation to remember them, let there be pride for the service, as well as sorrow for the sacrifice, because we will remember them not just with sadness, but also with eternal respect and gratitude, in the knowledge that we are living the future they fought for. As Dorian de Wind writes "*These heroes are dead*. *They died for liberty - they died for us. They are at rest. They sleep in the land they made free, under the flag they rendered stainless, under the solemn pines, the sad hemlocks, the tearful willows, and the embracing vines. They sleep beneath the shadows of the clouds, careless alike of sunshine or of storm, each in the windowless Place of Rest.*"

YES - Remembrance Sunday is a time to remember the fallen and honour their sacrifice; *but of great importance, it is a time to remember the families that share in that sacrifice everyday*; and it is a time to reflect on our own mortality and utter dependence on God. There are countless, and in many cases nameless, men and woman who have made the ultimate sacrifice to defend the freedom certainly worth defending. We read from John 15:13: "Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends." There is no higher expression

of love then to give up your very life – to be willing to leave family and friends behind, knowing death is immanent. To the many brave heroes who have gone before, thank you for your sacrifice of love. **WE WILL REMEMBER THEM**

PORTSMOUTH – BAMENDA SUNDAY

Last Sunday the Diocese celebrated the twinning of the Dioceses of Portsmouth and Bamenda which comes up every first Sunday of November. However it was deferred in our Parish because I knew I was going to be out for a Mass in Bournemouth and the Visiting Priest coming from another Diocese would not be in a position to talk about the link.

Four months after my Ordination to the Sacred priesthood I took up my first appointment in St. Matthias' Parish, Widikum. The Parish then had 48 mission stations and only 15 were accessible by a 4-wheel drive truck; it was an area of primary evangelization. This was the first time I experienced the much-needed help as a parish and diocese from the Diocese of Portsmouth. Later on as the Parish priest of St. Pius X Parish Akum for five years, Youth Chaplain of the Archdiocese for 7 years, the Communication Director for 5 years and then Principal of St. Paul's Comprehensive College, Nkwen for five years, I continued to receive substantial and valuable help from Portsmouth. Portsmouth Diocese is a household name in the Archdiocese of Bamenda, because her many priests who worked there scored a resounding success in their ministry of Evangelization. Many of them have their names chiselled in everlasting memory in the hearts of the people of Bamenda.

During the second visit of Bishop Crispian Hollis to the Archdiocese of Bamenda, Archbishop Paul Verdzekov, of blessed memory, made me the chauffeur for Bishop Crispian and his delegation from Portsmouth, to bring them to the various areas designated on his itinerary. He visited many parishes, colleges and institutions to see the projects which were financially sponsored or supported by the generous contributions from the good-hearted Christians from the Diocese of Portsmouth. As expected, the turnout of the people in these respective areas to welcome their august visitors was always overwhelming; they came firstly to say thank you and welcome.

There was always a visible sign of satisfaction on the faces of Bishop Crispian and his delegation when the projects, at various stages of completion, were presented. However, one could also notice how worried and concerned Bishop Crispian became when the next paragraphs of these presentations produced a list of many demands (a litany reminiscent of Oliver Twist wanting some more). I still remember vividly the Bishop telling the people that he couldn't do much alone, without the help of the people of Portsmouth. He encouraged us in Bamenda to continue to pray and ask God to bless the people of Portsmouth for their generosity and to bless the twinning of the two dioceses.

Today I am in Portsmouth Diocese as a *Fidei Donum* Priest, (a gift of Faith) not so much to pay back what the Diocese through her Clergy and Christians did for us and are still doing in Bamenda - but only to say that now I can do it too, because the Priests from Portsmouth showed us how. May God richly bless you and the Portsmouth – Bamenda link
