Reflection: November: the month for contemplating the Four Last Things – Death and Judgement, Heaven and Hell. So on Saturday my newspaper said: "Heaven and Hell have no place in the Church".Let me explain. Each Saturday we are offered a religious article by a 'professional', but there is also a contribution by an amiable former Tory MP who writes on all sorts of things from Catalonia to rearing llamas in Derbyshire (!), but cannot resist launching into the religious field despite a very shaky knowledge of Church history.He calls himself a "Protestant atheist", a handy title: if there is a Last Judgement, he can wave his Protestant flag, and if not ... well, it doesn't matter then, does it?

Like many English, he sees religion as a totally private thing. The prevailing word is "my". This is the absolute antithesis of Catholicism, which is based on "our": our faith is personal but is lived within a community of persons. He naturally cannot bear meddlesome priests, who stand in the way of private judgement, and he has no time for the saints, although in Catholic understanding we, to quote the Offertory prayer of All Saints, "sense their concern for our salvation".

To our friend, Heaven and Hell are merely concepts devised by the Church to threaten us or to dangle a carrot before us to induce good behaviour.

Now it must be said there is some truth in this: think of old style Catholic hell-fire missions (although the most common modern culprits are fundamentalist pastors).

It is still possible to read very unhelpful statements about our 'spiritual destiny', often from quite eminent places. Recently I read (and I do not reveal the source) that when we die we go to one of three places: to Heaven, if we are in a state of sainthood, to Hell, through our own wilful bad choices, or to Purgatory, to be equipped for the life of Heaven. I do not find that very helpful. It makes us sound like objects being passed through a coin sorting machine, or vegetables on some factory conveyor belt being sifted for quality.

Bu we are not objects, we are people in a relationship with God, one in which God always inspires, and we can respond. "All is gift." It is true that we cannot save ourselves. We can only accept, or reject, the divine gift offered to us.

Alas, this has sometimes been presented in a very mechanical way. Yet it is God's way to work with us: "grace perfects nature", as they say. Just last Sunday, the Post-Communion prayer said: "as we have been nourished by your gift of these heavenly sacraments, *may we be made ready* to receive what they promise".Luther hated the idea of "works", as if they earned us Heaven as a reward. He even chopped the Letter of St. James out of the Bible for stressing the role of works, and his embarrassed followers had to put it back in again.

But works are our good deeds done as a response to good. They make our relationship with God 'fluent'. They are not an end in themselves; "At the evening of our life," said Saint John of the Cross, "we shall be judged on our love". This is the significance of often misunderstood word 'merit': God enables us, and we respond. Or not. Hence Jesus' words: "To those who have more shall be given, from those who have not, even what they have will be taken away". If we do not exercise this God-given gift, it withers.But if we seek only to be good, then we become 'dogooders' for our duration in this world. And then.... what? Father David Sillince'
