THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK by Father David Sillince: How many times have you said the Lord's Prayer? Of course, you can't say. But do you know you may have been saying it wrong, at least according to the Bishops of Italy and France, and now Pope Francis? It all hinges on those words "lead us not into temptation". Can God do that? Let us carry out a little linguistic investigation. The Catholic Church translates its texts from a Latin original, but the Bible was not originally written in Latin. It was translated into Latin by St. Jerome in the 4th. Century and his version has recently been updated. The Lord's Prayer appears in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke (Matthew's is the version we are familiar with), both of which are written in Greek, though Matthew's was originally in Aramaic, the language of Jesus. Jesus may or may not have known any Greek, but it is improbable that he knew any Latin and he certainly didn't speak English!

Both evangelists use the verb eisenenkes from a verb meaning 'to lead in' (or possibly 'let in'). A professor at Rome's Gregorian University has said: "that is a very literal translation which must be interpreted". As was a famously said on another occasion: "he would say that, wouldn't he?" Jerome translated that as inducas, from which we get English words like 'induce' – as 'induce a coma' – and 'induction', as in those dreaded 'induction' sessions. Lead into what? Peirasmon. This primarily means 'a trial', 'a test'. Jerome translated it as temptationem (or tentationem) which certainly looks like 'temptation', but again primarily means 'a trial', 'a test'. Obviously there is a verbal link here; English 'tempt' and 'attempt' come from the same root. If we are given a 'test', we may be 'tempted' to give up.

In the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus wakes the sleeping disciples and tells them to watch and pray, 'lest they enter into *peirasmon*'. And St. Paul, writing to the Corinthians, says that God will not allow them to be *peirasthenai* (verb form) beyond what they can bear.

But would God do this? Isn't temptation Satan's job? Well, it seems God did it with his Son. At the story of Jesus' temptation in the desert, we read that Jesus 'anexthe (was lead up) by the spirit into the wilderness' [Matthew]. or more dramatically in Mark 'the spirit ekballei Jesus into the wilderness'. This last is a compound of ballo meaning to throw, from which we get our word 'ballistics' (as in 'Father David went ballistic'). The spirit threw Jesus out.

The ancient writer of the book of Job saw God and Satan as not being so far apart. God casually asks Satan: "Where have you been?" and Satan equally casually replies: "Oh, mooching about". And then Satan asks God for permission to test Job. It is a story based on the old question: if God is good, how can there be any evil? And sometimes it does seem as if God is not rushing to sort things out. A Russian priest, who had known the bitter persecution of Bolshevik times, said: "If you want God to tempt you, tempt you he certainly can". It would seem as if we are really defiant, God may actually say to Satan: "Just move over and leave this one to me". Perhaps we'd do best to going on saying the prayer the way we always have done.
