RACIAL PREJUDICE - A VICE NOT A VIRTUE FOR A CHRISTIAN

Let us take a moment and meditate on this beautiful hymn of John Oxenham (1852 1941) as today we celebrate Racial Justice Sunday.

1 In Christ there is no east or west, in him no south or north, but one great fellowship of love throughout the whole wide earth.
2 In Christ shall true hearts everywhere their high communion find; his service is the golden cord close-binding humankind.

3 Join hands, disciples of the faith, whate'er your race may be.
All children of the living God are surely kin to me.
4 In Christ now meet both east and west; in him meet south and north.
All Christly souls are one in him throughout the whole wide earth.

Last year – 2017 - some 26 Priests from about 12 different countries in the world met in London or a week attending a National course aimed at making them live and work happily in the UK. Among the many topics discussed were issues like 1) – downright racial attitudes, remarks and rejection even as one performs his ministry as Priest. 2) Living with the English Sarcasm 3) The scornful ways some English people accept corrections 4) The speed at which negative issues are spread (gossips) These came too hard for all of us, especially as the facilitators of the Course content were British citizens - Religious Men and Women, Priests and Lay people. This national course authorized and mandated by the Episcopal Conference of England and Wales is a simple way of accepting that Racial prejudice is noticeable among Christians and in the Church. Scientifically, humanity is comprised of exactly one race and this is the HUMAN RACE. Although the world has different ethnicities, geographies, citizenships, and cultures, all human beings are nearly identical genetically. The genetic differences that reflect variation in physical appearance across all mankind involve 0.01% of our genes.

WE ARE ALL MADE IN THE IMAGE AND LIKENESS OF GOD: All humans are made in the image of God (cf. Genesis 1:26-27), brought to life by His breath (Genesis 2:7), and imbued with an immaterial and immortal soul. Despite the genetic and spiritual unity of the human race, racism still exists, as people choose to treat others poorly because they look different or are from a different culture.

God doesn't discriminate against a person's skin colour. That is because God always looks at the heart and not the outward appearance (cf. 1 Sam 16:7). All of us originated from Adam and Eve, and so we all bleed red, and we are all equal in God's sight, although He does regard those who have trusted in His Son, Jesus Christ. The Apostle John reminds us that "Whoever says he is in the light and hates his brother is still in darkness" (1 John 2:9), and again, "whoever hates his brother is in the darkness and walks in the darkness, and does not know where he is going, because the darkness has blinded his eyes" (1 John 2:11).

GOD'S WORDS TO ISRAEL: God was clear in His rules to the Israelites regarding those from different nations. In Deuteronomy 10:17-18, Moses asserts God's love of the foreigner and then exhorts the Israelites to love them as well (verse 19). God did make a distinction between foreigners who desired to follow Him and/or blessed His people and those who did not. In 1 Kings 8:41-43, Solomon acknowledges that foreigners will pray to God, and God will hear them. Nations that respected God's will were to be blessed (cf. Genesis 12:2-3).

However, nations that practiced widespread child sacrifice and temple prostitution were to be destroyed (Deuteronomy 20:17-18). This was not a racial issue. It was God protecting His people from sinful influences. Jesus exemplified God's grace. In John 4, He had a long conversation with a Samaritan woman, although the Samaritans were an ethnic group the Jews despised. As a result, many from her village followed Him. He was quick to heal Gentiles and praise their faith (cf. Matthew 8:5-13; 15:22-28). And He taught His church to do the same (cf. Acts 10-11). The Apostle Paul's ministry was to the Gentiles. The inclusiveness of Jesus' message is summarized in Galatians 3:28: "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

NOT FROM THE BIBLE: Unfortunately, humanity has twisted the Bible to try to justify human fears and prejudices. Some consider the "curse of Ham" to be an excuse to hate those of African descent. Others insist that the Jews were responsible for Jesus' death and deserve our derision. Both views are patently false. The Bible tells us that God's judgment is not based on appearances but what is on the inside (cf. 1 Samuel 16; 7), and those who do judge according to appearances do so with evil intent (cf. James 2:4). Instead, we are to treat one another with love (cf. James 2:8), regardless of ethnicity (cf. Acts 10:34-35) and social standing (cf. James 2:1-5). Christian love negates all prejudice, and the Bible condemns racism.

HOW A CHRISTIAN MUST RESPOND: A Christian's response to any form of racial prejudices is to reject it. Prejudice is part of our fallen human natures (cf. Romans 3:23; and Psalm 51:5). As Christians we all harbour bias to some degree, whether it be racial, gender, educational, or socio-economic. Exalting ourselves by demeaning others is a common behaviour we find in the world. But, when we are baptized into Christ, He changes our nature. What feels "normal" to us then must be brought under the guidance of the Holy Spirit's who gives us the grace to live as brothers and sisters. St. Paul tells us in Colossians 3:9-11 to, "Put off the old self with its practices and put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator. Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free, but Christ is all, and in all."

There is no place for racial prejudice or any like thinking in the life of a Christian in Christ. Racial differences are not to be condemned or ignored, but celebrated, especially within the family of God. There will be a rainbow of skin colours and ethnicities surrounding the throne of God one day, not because God tolerates it, but because He loves it and wills it. (cf. Rev. 7:9; 14:6). He made each of us the way He wants us (cf. Psalm 139:13) and enjoys the many ways we reflect His glory through our physical appearances, our inherited traits, and our ethnic variations. St. Paul tells us in Galatians 3:28, "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." One of Jesus' deepest longings was that we "be one" as He and the Father are one (cf. John 17:21). Racial prejudices destroy that oneness; therefore, a Christian should hate it as God does.

How will people tell us apart from the rest of the world? Jesus says, "you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (cf. John 13:34-35), and that leaves no room for any type of prejudices.

PRAY FOR THEM: The Apostle Paul, who was once Saul and an enemy of the Church, of Christ, should make us see clearly that God can save anyone! Since we are told to "pray for those who spitefully discriminate, abuse and use people, and persecute you" (Matt 5:44), we know it is Jesus' will that we pray for those who are presently our enemies or enemies of the cross. Few other world religions would teach or believe that we should pray for an enemy, but that's the radical love of God. Dying for those who were once His enemies (Rom 5:10). Pray that God would soften their hearts and that they would seek repentance and then Christ.

Pray for those who are prejudiced, and then give them what they don't deserve...your love and your prayers. That's the only way they'll know we are Jesus' disciples (John 13:34-35)
