HAS GOD FAVOURITES? DOES HE FAVOUR SOME PEOPLE OVER OTHERS?

This is a question that will never go away, because it is based upon our human understanding of favouritism, which usually means unfair treatment and suffering of anyone who is not favoured. When we think of favouritism, we imagine a place of higher status and less responsibility. But God's favour often comes with added duties and more difficult challenges. In our first reading from ACTS, Peter told Cornelius and his household that, "The truth I have come to realise is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him."

To completely understand this question whether God favours some people over others; we have to start with the truth that God is always just (Deuteronomy 32:4; Psalm 7:11). We know He loves everyone because every human being is created in His image (<u>John 3:16</u>; <u>Genesis 1:26</u>). His judgment is always right. So if He favours someone, it is only a sign that such an individual has been given a singular grace for the accomplishment of all.

If we are trying to determine whom God loves based on how much good things happen in their life, then we are only going in a very frustrating direction. It's impossible to tell whom God favours by looking for positive circumstances in people's lives. The Scriptures makes us know that Jesus was the Beloved of God on whom his favour rested. Yet Jesus died the shameful excruciated and bloody death on the cross. The angel Gabriel greeted Mary with these words: "Greetings, you who are highly favoured! The Lord is with you" (Luke 1:28). We have no further record as to why Mary was chosen, but the result of God's favour upon her was that she had to bear great sorrow and difficulty as the mother of the Messiah. The "sword" would "pierce her soul" (Luke 2:35). God chose prophets and kings for His own sovereign reasons (Exodus 33:17; Daniel 10:11; 1 Samuel 2:26). We know how these prophets were treated and these Kings suffered.

Take Job, God favoured him and God allowed him to suffer. God favoured Moses and the Jews enslaved in Egypt and he let them wander in the desert for two generations and Moses never entered the Promised Land. God "favoured" John the Baptist and God allowed him to be imprisoned and die by beheading. Peter was the stone on which Christ built the Church but he died a martyr's death. Paul was close to God, and someone cut off his head. The Apostles where Christ chosen few suffered very much and all except John were killed. Joseph was close to God, and was sold and worked as a slave in Egypt. Stephen was also very close to God, and a mob stoned him to death. God chose Solomon from all of David's sons to become the next king (1 Chronicles 28:5–6). He gifted him in wealth, in popularity, and in wisdom not for his own good but to rule the people of God. (1 Kings 5:12). However, many of those whom God favoured were persecuted and suffered hardship because of the mantle of responsibility God placed upon them. God says to Moses, 'I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion.' It does not, therefore, depend upon human desire or effort, but on God's mercy." By Favouring Abraham, many nations are blessed. By Favouring the prophet, the people are led from slavery into the Promised Land. By Favouring Israel, many nations are blessed.

The truth is this; God favours you so that you can know and reciprocate His Desire to favour all. Because by favouring some over all, He seeks to favour all who relate with the some. It is like He is choosing vocal cords that can be shaped to carry His Voice to all the earth. In this way, the gospel is preached to many and so God favours some so that the some can become His ambassadors to all. However, as long as we are on this earth, it is worth nothing that God's ambassadors suffer and die. This is because favour comes with suffering for God here on earth but this suffering is crowned with glory in heaven.

Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened. It is true that God does answer the prayers of His children. He makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. – Matthew 5:45. God blesses people because He chooses to do so for his own kind reasons. It is not about an individual's ability to merit God's good favour, but always about His unfathomable mercy.

So is God's favour arbitrary? Do our choices have any impact on whether we are among His favourites? Isaiah 66:2 says, "These are the ones I look on with favour: those who are humble and contrite in spirit, and who tremble at my word." God wants to show us all His favour, but in His sovereign knowledge, He chooses some for special assignment and blessing. When God gave Moses instructions about building the tabernacle, He named two men that He had specifically chosen to do the artistic work. (Exodus 31:1–4, 6). Sometimes, God chooses people because He has gifted them in special ways for special service. As they fulfil the calling He placed on their lives, they find favour with Him (Exodus 33:13).

God is not limited in His favour. He does not rank us in order of importance, nor is His favour something we must compete with one another to earn. Every child of God who comes to Him through faith in Jesus Christ has the favour of God. Psalm 5:12 says, "For you bless the righteous, O Lord; you cover him with favour as with a shield." It is not our own righteousness that earns us favour; we are declared righteous through the cleansing of our sins by the blood of Christ. As we grow in faith and seek to please Him, God demonstrates His favour by drawing near to us. He desires to bestow favour on everyone who seeks Him. He grants spiritual gifts to all His children to use in His service (1 Corinthians 12:5–7; 1 Peter 4:10). Even the Lord's discipline is a means of showing favour to His children. Hebrews 12:5–6 says, "My son, do not make light of the Lord's discipline, and do not lose heart when he rebukes you, because the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and he chastens everyone he accepts as his son."

God's favourites are His children, purchased through the blood of His Son (John 1:12). As we honour Jesus, God's favour follows us. That favour may manifest itself through greater responsibility, blessing, or even suffering for His sake (Acts 5:41). The reward of His favour is His promise that "all things work together for the good to those who love God and are called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28). When we are God's favourites, we know He is always with us and will reward us for everything done for Him (Matthew 28:20; Revelation 22:12).

Some people have gifts that help in society. If they identify the best arena to use that gift, some become exceptional. If they do not, many consider themselves below-average because their gifts are poorly used. In particular, one can look at the young man that asked Jesus what he could do to become perfect. Jesus, knowing the young man's heart, recognized that he loved his wealth and possessions. For such a person, the greatest trial is to give them the wealth and possessions and then ask them to share, but this challenge caused the young man to go away sad. As such, we should not reach particular conclusions about who God loves based on how they are created or what they have acquired, instead focus on their relationship with God and their fellow men.
