ATTITUDES AFFECTING THE SPREAD OF THE GOSPEL

Our Gospel today, St. Mark shows us that many people of Jesus' hometown of Nazareth did not accept him as a prophet because they "knew" him and his family too well. They knew that he was the Son of a carpenter with no schooling in Mosaic Law and knew that he could not be the promised Messiah who would come from Bethlehem as a descendant of David's royal family. Besides, they were angry when Jesus did not work any miracles in Nazareth but chided them with prophetic courage for their lack of Faith and warned that he would go to other people to do his preaching and healing ministry.

The story of what happened to Jesus when he decided to return to his town is a familiar story, one that happens to all of us: we achieve wonderful things far away from home – in another city, or perhaps in some other part of the world, where we are not well known; then the time comes when we know we must return to our own country and teach there, and we find that people at home do not see us in the same way. As we reflect on this passage, you may find yourself identifying with the people who rejected Jesus because he was so well known to them. Or you may prefer to identify with Jesus, remembering times when you or others had an experience like his. This Sunday's reflection gives us the opportunity to see other reasons we fail to evangelise.

Lack of Gospel Knowledge: St. Jerome who single-handedly wrote the commentary on the entire 73 books of the Bible said "Ignorance of the Bible is ignorance of Christ. If you have been a Christian, even for a short time, you have likely heard the gospel hundreds of times. Yet, many of us still struggle to articulate the truths of the gospel in a simple, coherent, and intelligible way. Could you share the essential message of the gospel in sixty seconds, right now?

Attitude: Sometimes we don't care that much about lost people. We might not have said it, but our priorities and lives reveal it. We make no time in our busy schedules to interact and engage with those who do not know Christ. We have long stopped praying for lost people in our neighbourhoods and workplaces. We have no non-Christian friends, and barely any ties. We could even say that lost people are a low priority. For instance, when was the last time you invited someone into your home who did not know Christ?

Fear of being known: What will others think of me? What if they don't like me or my family? Some are paralyzed by the thought of being disliked, marginalized, laughed at, or openly mocked. We are afraid we will lose business or get passed up for that promotion. What if they stop inviting my kids to the birthday parties or to play with their own children? What if talking about Christ makes seeing my neighbours awkward?

We give no priority to evangelism. This may sound strange. But Christians who do not make evangelism a high priority are really making it no priority at all. Our hobbies take a better part of our time.

Many laypersons believe that evangelism is what we pay the pastors and staff to do. Such a perspective is first unbiblical and, second, unproductive. Christ gave the command to his Apostles

and to all of us to go and reach the gospel to all Nations and Baptize people in the Triune God. St, Paul reminds us that the task of preaching the Gospel is obligatory to all believers.

The blaming culture. So pastors blame it on the laity. The laity blame it on the pastor. And both blame it on culture, the denomination, or some other external scapegoat.

We should constantly pray for Mission of the Church. Many members are pretty good at praying for those who have physical needs. But above all we should pray for people who have the greatest need: a personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

We must preach by example: Evangelism always ultimately includes a clear articulation of the gospel. But too many Christians never get that opportunity to share the gospel, because they fail to show Christ in their actions and compassion.

The issue in our Gospel reading is that they knew him a little too well. Hence the saying Familiarity breeds contempt. He was no one great, they said, no one extraordinary. He is one of us. The carpenter. The son of Mary. He was born amongst us. He lives with us. He works with us. He shares our sorrows and our joys. He carries our sins and our sufferings. He celebrates alongside us. He turns our water into wine, and our mourning into hope. He is part of our families, part of our lives. The Ordinariness of Christ, and his relative insignificance in his own time, is precisely the most important thing about him.

This is expressed so well in this famous passage

He was born in an obscure village The child of a peasant woman *He grew up in another obscure village* Where he worked in a carpenter's shop Until he was thirty *He never wrote a book He never held an office He never went to college He never visited a big city* He never travelled more than two hundred miles From the place where he was born He did none of the things Usually associated with greatness He had no credentials but himself He was only thirty three His friends ran away One of them denied him He was turned over to his enemies And went through the mockery of a trial

He was nailed to a cross between two thieves While dying, his executioners gambled for his clothing The only property he had on earth When he was dead He was laid in a borrowed grave Through the pity of a friend Twenty centuries have come and gone. All the armies that have ever marched All the navies that have ever sailed All the parliaments that have ever sat All the kings that ever reigned put together Have not affected the life of mankind on earth As powerfully as that one solitary life

God shares and touches and embraces our lives. The one who made everything, who made us, is one of us. He is with us.
