THE RICHNESS OF GOD'S WISDOM

In today's Gospel a rich man appears seeking something more. In Luke's version, he is a rich, young man. From the start we are given the distinct impression that this person knows nothing about what is really important. He is rich, he is young, he knows nothing! His words only confirm the impression. He begins with a subtle flattery – "Good Master". Then he wants to know what he can do to guarantee his future security. He thinks goodness is another thing you can possess.

Jesus begins the process of stripping him of his illusions. Why do you call me good? No one is good except God alone. We too think goodness/holiness is something we must have, something we must do. When we think like that we start judging ourselves and others, we divide and separate. With this approach to life we cannot enter the Kingdom of God. God's kingdom is about love, acceptance, gratuity, freedom and community.

Jesus then starts probing this person. What has he learnt and experienced, what are his desires? Has he kept the commandments? Jesus outlines the ethical commandments and then quite unexpectedly throws in "You must not defraud". Jesus either knows something specific about how this person acquired their wealth or is presuming that no one could become wealthy without some root injustice. The man doesn't hear what Jesus is saying, he has a blind spot on the acquisition of wealth. He still wants something more. Jesus looks steadily at this person. It is a look of acceptance and love. Jesus is not shaming him or judging and rejecting him, just calling him further on the spiritual path.

Then comes the word that exposes the young man's problem that he himself doesn't even realize. He thinks he lacks that something that will enable him to possess eternal life. The irony is that he is possessed by his possessions and what he lacks is the freedom to let them go. If, as Jesus implies, he has acquired his wealth by some sort of fraud then he needs to give it back to the poor and follow Jesus. The young man is totally dejected by this and goes away sad. Hopefully the sadness and disillusionment will be the things God uses to eventually free him from his dependency.

Jesus' teaching is not just a shock for the young man it is a big shock for the other disciples! Help! What can we do? Who can be saved? We can do nothing to get saved. It is impossible for us. But nothing is impossible for God! They presumed that wealth was a blessing from God. Jesus is now saying it can be the very thing that keeps us from God.

Our affluence has provided us with weapons of mass distraction – we are permanently too busy, too pre-occupied, always trapped within prisons of our own making, there is never any real space for God or others. God's wisdom exposes the shallowness of conventional wisdom. We all believe in ownership, in acquisition, in possessing. But this worldly wisdom doesn't get us into the kingdom of God. In God's kingdom all are brothers and sisters, God's gifts are there to be used well and responsibly, to be shared freely and joyfully without judgement or distinction (God sends his sun to shine on good and bad alike) but they are never ours. And the ways of the kingdom are so subversive of popular wisdom that there is always persecution. (DMA).
