IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF THE WIDOW – MARKS OF A COMMITTED CHRISTIAN

Our Gospel today presents to us a widow who has been at the heart of all Christian teaching on Charity. She did not set out to impress anybody. Her one only desire was to act from the belief that her action must match the conviction of her faith.

As Christians, the Bible is clear throughout its pages that we're called to give generously. Even in the book of Exodus chapter 35, we see the Israelites all generously giving the materials and time to build the tabernacle. If any of those people decided to withhold the materials they owned or the skills they had, the tabernacle wouldn't have come together.

In the New Testament God himself gave us his only son because he loves us so much, and that Son died on a cross for us. It sets a model that generosity in God's people should be sacrificial. Here's a small sampling of what the Bible has to say about giving and generosity.

Why should we give generously? : To answer this question we go to 1 John 3:16-18 - This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person? Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth. How can we ever convince people that we understand the Gospels if we do not act on what we read in its pages? Luke 6:44 - For each tree is known by its own fruit. Indeed, people do not gather figs from thorn bushes, or grapes from brambles.

Marks of a Generous Giver: The love of money is a central cultural idol in our world today, and so it is always a blessing to meet with so many people in the Church and outside the Church who are sacrificial givers. It is very true that church's members should engage in radical economic sharing with one another so that "there are no needy among them". Such sharing also promotes a radically generous commitment of time, money, relationships, and living space to social justice and the needs of the poor, the oppressed, the immigrant, and the economically and physically weak.

Let us therefore see these marks of Christian generosity which fully define us as Christians as St. Matthew says *by their fruit you will recognize them*. (Mt. 7:20)

1. You see your role as a steward.

"All the earth is the Lord's and all things therein" (Ps. 24:1). You know you're merely returning to God what rightly belongs to him.

St. Matthew reminds us thus: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where

your treasure is, there your heart will be also. Matthew 6:19-21. As Paul tells us, "We brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world" (1 Tim. 6:7).

2. Share locally with your neighbours: First and foremost you give locally—to your family, your church, your neighbours. Jesus illustrates this "proximity principle" in the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25–37). Your giving to your local church and neighbourhood help keep your heart and prayers rooted with your brothers and sisters in Christ. As you grow in grace, you will yearn to give more.

3. You are concerned for the Missions: You become concerned for the works of the Missions and Missionaries. You started giving to support works of evangelism, Christian education, formation of the Clergy and the Training of Priests, alleviating the pain of natural disasters and so on. As you're able, you give generously to a few of these organizations in big ways.

4. You sacrifice willingly: Here you're inspired by biblical examples like the widow's mite and the parable of the sheep and the goats where Jesus concludes, "As you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me"

5. You know God loves a cheerful giver: You're convinced that God treasures cheerful giving and you try to grasp the depth of God's generosity to you in Christ and you realize that your giving is an instrument in his kingdom. You overflow with joy at participating in God's work in the world.

6. Your giving is marked by (mostly) secret generosity: You become aware of your heart's tendency toward Pharisaism—doing the right thing for the wrong reason; pretending to be holy and give only to be noticed or praised. So you heed the advice in Matthew 6:1–4, where Jesus commands: "Do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret."

Secret giving goes against convention in philanthropy, where supporters are listed by size of gift and buildings bear the names of wealthy donors. Churches and Christian organizations often rightly avoid these conventions. I think Jesus makes room for (occasional) exceptions, however. He made public the generosity of the widow in. He knew her example would inspire and convict. Don't go seeking praises. The Lord may use your faithfulness to influence others.

7. You give consistently: You're not a sporadic or haphazard giver, giving gifts occasionally. Faithful generosity requires discipline, which in turn provides stability to your causes.

More scriptural verses to remind us of how important our generosity works in our favour instead.

Proverbs 20:11 - Even a young man is known by his actions whether his conduct is pure and upright. Matthew 12:33 - Make a tree good and its fruit will be good, or make a tree bad and its fruit will be bad; for a tree is known by its fruit.

Luke 6:43 - No good tree bears bad fruit, nor does a bad tree bear good fruit.

James 2:18 - But someone will say, "You have faith and I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds.

James 3:12 - My brothers, can a fig tree grow olives, or a grapevine bear figs? Neither can a salt **Fr. George Ngwa**

Since the Mass is the "source and summit" of the Christian Life, we naturally look to that Holy Sacrifice of Christ, containing the perfect prayer, to offer for our deceased relatives and friends who may still need the help of our prayers. Priests are under a strict obligation to remember in a special way the person for whom the Mass is being offered. Often you will hear the priests say the name of the person in the part of the Mass which specifically remembers those who have gone before us. Sometimes the bulletin or announced before the Mass. intention for the Mass is listed in the We can't really speak of "time" since the deceased person has entered eternity, but we can speak in terms of "final purification" before entrance into heaven. We believe that a Mass offered for a departed relative or friend may help hasten that final purification which he/she may still be undergoing in ves. Mass does help lessen the soul's time purgatory. So a in purgatory. And since the Mass truly is the Sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross, it is the most perfect prayer and sacrifice. MISSIO RED BOXES – The A.P.F. Mill Hill Missionaries Appeal

As mentioned in a previous Newsletter, Yvonne is standing down at the end of the year after 16 years as local Secretary for the Missio Red Boxes appeal. The money raised helps support 16,523 clinics, 9.492 orphanages, 612 care homes and people with leprosy, 15,679 homes for the elderly or disabled, 368,520 lay missionaries, 116,843 seminarians and 415,656 priests. Help is given in India, Mongolia, the Philippines, Cameroon, Uganda, Kenya, Zambia, Zimbabwe, South Africa, Sri Lanka and Myanmar. Collectors are vital at local level to carry on this important work and therefore we are putting out a plea to anybody in the Congregation who would be prepared to help.
