BLESSINGS & CURSES - HAPPINESS & WOE

Not everything is as it seems. The most colourful and attractive plants can turn out to be the most poisonous. Simple, ordinary unattractive things sometimes prove to be the most important. Nothing can be taken for granted. Things have to be tested, experienced and evaluated. What may be helpful at one stage in life can be harmful later on. What at first may seem a strength, or a gift or a special talent may later become a burden, a limitation or a source of pain.

Life is dynamic. It is always moving, growing and changing. We never really stand still, we change, our relationships change, our needs and capacities change. The need for comfort today can become the addiction of tomorrow.

The deeper wisdom of life and the gifts of the Spirit are not automatically transmitted from one generation to another. They have to be personally communicated and actively received. Girls do not automatically become mature, responsible and free women. Boys do not automatically become mature, responsible and free men. The whole person has to be nurtured and developed according to their capacity, physically, emotionally, intellectually socially and spiritually.

The particular quality of tolerance that has evolved in European society has enabled diverse peoples to live together in peace and even to celebrate difference as a gift from God. It has taken hundreds of years to reach this point and hopefully the spiritual attitudes that express true tolerance will help humanity attain a whole new

level of consciousness. There is a growing awareness of the need to actively work for peace, to remove causes of hatred and oppression, to challenge the abuse of power. There is a greater awareness of the need to cherish the earth and its environment.

There is greater openness to see goodness and truth in those who are different. There is a growing hunger for spiritual depth, meaning and vision. But this growing spiritual movement is fragile. The baton of wisdom and faith has to be handed on to each successive generation or the consequences could be dire. Just one individual wounded by a lack of hope, love and self-esteem can do untold damage to themselves and others.

When the dominant forces in society place too much value on the superficial and material then the blessings of wealth, comfort, power, good looks and celebrity can soon become curses. Being inherently transient any one who seeks their identity in them will be like the person who built their house on sand. This self or ego becomes insecure and transient, prone to anxiety, fear, defensive anger and aggression. Conditions that at first seem limiting can be the ones that allow love and relationship to flourish where the person is valued above all and where there is space for the Divine encounter. A heart that is full, satisfied and comfortable only in passing created things has little room or desire for God and God's deep, unfailing joy. There is also little room for real relationships with others except as ego enhancers and satisfiers of one's needs. (DMA)

(from the Diocesan E-News - 12th Feb). Pastoral Visitation of Lymington, Milford on Sea and Brockenhurst: This last weekend, I undertook the Pastoral Visitation of three parish communities in the New Forest joined together under the pastoral care of one parish priest, Fr. David Adams: Our Lady and St. Joseph's, Lymington (a fine Victorian church tucked away on the High Street between the shops), St. Anne's Brockenhurst (where they have to close the gates during Mass in case animals wander in from the forest) and St. Francis of Assisi, Milford on Sea (a pretty village church just along from the green). The first thing that strikes me is the energy of Fr. David Adams! He has both Saturday evening and Sunday morning Masses in Lymington, plus a 9 o'clock Mass in Milford and a Sunday evening Mass in Brockenhurst, in addition to weekday Masses and the care of three distinctive communities with their particular needs and a primary school. The parishes are small, yet vibrant and full of enthusiasm. I met with parochial representatives on Saturday evening after Mass to talk about mission and evangelisation. On Sunday afternoon, we had a holy hour of prayer with Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction for vocations. I then met with twenty young adults from across the parishes to talk about the future. The Pastoral Visitations follow the same template, which includes Sunday lunch with the clergy - always a great moment to share together. Linda, Fr. David's housekeeper, looked after us royally and we had a lively time! There is now a deacon in Lymington, Deacon Anthony Cairns, who moved into the area with his wife just before Christmas and also two retired priests, who help out, Fr. Peter Ryan and Fr. David Quarmby.
