SS. PETER & PAUL - YEAR "C" 30TH JUNE 2019

Some issues affecting Christianity today in our Churches.

Today the Church of England and Wales celebrate the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul. She honours two fundamental pillars of the early Church. While all the Apostles form the foundation, Peter and Paul stand out very profoundly in terms of influence and work. And while some have wished to suggest division between them, the Church insists that they must been seen together; hence their feast is set forth in this way. As we celebrate this feast, I find myself reflecting seriously in the lives of two other giants in the faith in our own land who copying from them stood out and gained the highest price of discipleship — martyrdom. Yes, Saints John Fisher and Thomas More. The Church will not be the same if we just try one bit to imitate their zealousness in discipleship. In a world plagued with one crisis after another such as: incurable epidemics, economic disasters, international aggression, terrorist extremism, insurmountable poverty to list only a few — what are the biggest issues facing Christians today?

A Cheap Diluted Faith? The chief dangers which confront the present century is: Religion without the action of the Holy Spirit, Christianity without Christ, forgiveness without repentance, politics without God, seeking worldly pleasure without direction, life without control and Heaven without Hell. In a society in which there are no absolutes and every individual is a free agent, we are taught to be self-reliant and independent. God becomes an intrusion into our lives and we only know him when we need him. Christianity is no longer the automatic, default faith of young adults and that's a problem.

Pride is the major issue facing Christians. It opens the door for everything else to come in. The same sin that got Satan kicked out of heaven – and the same sin that is causing so much separation in the church today. Many Christians do not even realise that Pride is not only a sin but a deadly sin – a mortal sin. You have to admit you are ill before you can realize the need for healing. And the few who do recognize this find it easy to transfer their sin onto the Church and its members. They separate themselves from the Church and judge her. Let us not forget that Christ love the Church his Bride and so it is time to love the church the same way Christ loved us and died for us.

Bible Illiteracy and lack of sound Catechesis. I find this the biggest problem which is making many to is go in the wrong direction. What used to be basic, universally known truths about Christianity are now unknown mysteries to a large and growing number of Christians, especially young adults. For instance, most people regard Good Friday and Easter Sunday more as a bank holiday; only a minority of adults associate Easter with the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Talk less about Christmas which has become so commercialized with little or no focus on baby Jesus. Therefore, if the Bible is not regarded as the only truth on which to build the Church, then subjective opinions will surely go a long way to counteract these truths.

Closed Minds? Non-Christian points of view are destructive to the faith. A biblically educated Christian knows that some basic, universally known truths about Christianity are pagan myths that actually contradict what God's Word says about critical issues. So, the answer is not to bar any outside ideas but treat them with an open mind in the light of the Gospels and the magisterium.

Which Way Should We Go? A lack of direction. We are torn between saying things that people want to hear and humanity's yearning for answers. Every week there seems to be a new issue that confronts Christians. As a result we can't make up our minds and swing like a pendulum from one extreme to the other. "Does the future

lie with progressives who can adapt and change – or with conservatives who remain faithful to the old paths? "Are Christians today basically too timid – or just afraid to act?

A Lukewarm Attitude. Why would a Christian be reticent about living and sharing his faith in Jesus Christ? Could it be because neither the Word nor the Lord is real to them? And could that be because the doctrine presented to most Christians already self-conceited and illogical, self-contradictory, confusing, unmotivating? There is the tendency of preaching a subjectively erroneous doctrine to people as a show off which ends up confusing them. Furthermore, the church and its members must be engaged in her programmes and not be left in the hands of a few individuals.

A Lack of Honesty. Christianity is about doing the right thing. The world is a great place and life is so much fun, but honesty in people is something very difficult to find. In our Christian communities and the society at large, there is a crisis due to a breakdown of trust. Who do people trust? Politicians? Bankers? The many Churches today and their pastors who are literally out to make money in the name of evangelization? Adults? Police? Businessmen and women, Scientists and the list is long. Christians need to return to basics and live Christ-like lives that build trust and point individuals to the Master we serve. Why should non-Christians trust Christ if we do not live loving, humble, obedient, self-sacrificing lives as Jesus taught us.

Bad Name and Publicity. Then there's the bad press that the church has received in recent years – ranging from the hate messages to the sexual scandals that have wracked the Catholic church. In the midst of it all, the influence of Christianity on culture and individual lives is largely invisible. We cannot deny the fact that Christianity has provenly added more value to various cultures than any other philosophy, ideology or religion,

Back to the Basics Simple things. We have to stop talking quite so much about visions, plans, strategies, new teachings, missions, buildings, teams and heresies and just start being the heart, hands, voice and compassion of the Body of Christ.

Are We Willing to Serve? Only the Lord Jesus can really touch your heart to the degree that your love for him makes you a servant and a disciple to him, and one who can articulate his faith in such a manner that others can believe. So, seek Him. Ask Him to show you what you are supposed to do. That's always been the underlying power of Christianity. "Be still and know that I am God," we are told. And listen for direction, because perhaps that's the one great issue facing Christ's church: Too few are listening to Him!
