Christian Mission

Christian mission is following Christ's call, sharing the gospel with the lost world through God's wisdom and strength. This is what we celebrate today World Mission Sunday.

Christian mission is obeying Christ

After Christ's death and resurrection, the Lord commanded the disciples to share the gospel, the message of His redemption: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:19–20).

This Great Commission applies to Christians today. Rather than weighing us down with a burden, obeying God's call brings joy and reward in heaven. We should fulfil our mission not out of duty but love: "For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again. . . . All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:14–21).

God could convert everyone using a blinding light and the voice of Christ as He did with the apostle Paul. Instead, He gives Christians the mission of reconciliation (Acts 1:8–9). He works through us, calling sinners to turn to Christ in repentance and faith.

Christian mission is sharing Christ - Our mission is proclaiming Christ as the only Saviour from sin and the only way to abundant, eternal life. Whom do we tell? Jesus told Christians to reach out to "all nations" (Matthew 28:19). Jesus sends us to all people groups, to every ethnic culture without a gospel witness.

Christian missions, however, is not limited to overseas ministry. While believers should faithfully support those who go to the unreached on foreign soil, all Christians have the mission to share Christ on the home field with family, friends, co-workers, and the community. The Christian mission of sharing Christ does not end with a sinner's salvation. The commission was to make disciples—not immature believers. Thus, Christian missions involves not only evangelism but also discipleship.

Christian mission is relying on Christ - Sharing the gospel humbly, boldly, and passionately is our Christian mission. But we cannot do it alone. The power and results of Christian missions come from the Lord. He gives us the wisdom, strength, and desire to witness! Through our witness, He works repentance and faith in the sinner's heart (2 Corinthians 5:20–21).

Although mission is ultimately God's work, Christians are responsible to understand and share the gospel and to have a strong relationship with Christ. Such a relationship guards against hypocrisy. "But in your

hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect, keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against your good behaviour in Christ may be ashamed of their slander" (1 Peter 3:15–16). Jesus assured us that suffering would accompany missions, but God uses even suffering for good (Romans 8:28). In sum, Christian missions is obeying Christ, sharing Christ, and relying on Christ. Specifically, God sends missionaries through the support of the church to the unreached. All Christians, however, have the mission of reconciliation. The Lord works through them to rescue the lost. What greater mission can one have?

'God's Word Changed My Life,' Says Former Street Kid

20-year-old Groum Pale knows first hand what it's like to be a street kid – constantly hungry, afraid and in despair. Today, this dedicated young Christian spends much of his time among some of Addis Ababa's many street kids, sharing God's Word and love with them.

Groum and his sisters found themselves homeless and alone when their parents died of HIV and AIDS and spent years on the streets, surviving on scraps of food they found in rubbish bins. They were often ill and worst of all; they were in a constant state of anxiety, not knowing what the next day would bring.

But then, when Groum was nine, Hannah's Orphanage – a Christian-run home for street kids – rescued them. The orphanage workers restored them to health, gave them a place to call home and shared God's love with them. Groum said it took a while for him to trust this kindness.

Lost part of my childhood - "I lost a whole part of my childhood living on the streets because I saw horrible things," he says. "There, you learn how to be a fighter and to be mistrustful of everyone. I had to learn how to trust."

Reading the Amharic Bible - Within a year he was unrecognisable from the street kid he had been. He was excelling at school and had developed a strong faith in Jesus – thanks to listening to Bible stories on the *Faith Comes By Hearing* Proclaimer devices provided to the orphanage by the Bible Society of Ethiopia.

"We loved listening to those wonderful Bible stories," he recalls with a smile. "We would listen hard and then, at night, as we fell asleep, we would try to repeat the stories to each other. I felt that the voice that came out of that little black box was actually God's voice, and so, when I meditated and prayed, I could hear his words in my head. It encouraged me so much.

Recited Bible passages out loud - "Getting to know God's Word changed my life. When my friends and I faced any difficulty we would recite out loud passages that we had heard and use them to encourage each other." Today, Groum is in the final year at school, where he is top of his class, and plans to go on to study civil engineering at university. He says he wants to help change his country for the better.

Groum was delighted with his new Proclaimer - "This has all happened not because of my own potential but because I have Christ. If you have Christ, you have everything, even if you don't have anything else. He is everything to me."

Proclaimers devices were damaged or stolen - Most days, when his classes are over, Groum can be found helping street kids and the younger children at the orphanage. He used to play Bible stories for them on one of the orphanage's Proclaimers, but they were all recently damaged or stolen when the orphanage had to move premises after the authorities took their land. So now he just reads out loud to them from the Bible.

"One passage that really spoke to me when I was 16 and listening to the Bible on the Proclaimer was where Paul talks about spreading the Word of God by 'any means possible'. That has become my mission." Groum was delighted when he was given a Proclaimer by visitors from the British and Foreign Bible Society, which will also be replacing all the other Proclaimers lost in the move.
