# Pope Francis urges people to create Nativity scenes with their families

"They help us to relive the history of what took place in Bethlehem"

Pope Francis has urged Christians to set up as many Nativity scenes as possible this Christmas. Setting up Christmas cribs is a simple reminder of "God's tender love" and "helps us to relive the history of what took place in Bethlehem."

"I wish to encourage the beautiful family tradition of preparing the Nativity scene in the days before Christmas, but also the custom of setting it up in the workplace, in schools, hospitals, prisons and town squares," "It is my hope that this custom will never be lost and that, wherever it has fallen into disuse, it can be rediscovered and revived."

The Nativity scene's starry sky respects the Gospel's account of Jesus' birth but also reminds people that even in darkness "God does not abandon us. From the time of its Franciscan origins the Nativity scene has invited us to 'feel' and 'touch' the poverty that God's son took upon himself in the incarnation. Jesus was born in poverty and led a simple life in order to teach us to recognise what is essential and to act accordingly. When we place the infant Jesus in the manger, the Nativity scene suddenly comes alive. God appears as a child, for us to take into our arms. Standing before the Christmas crib, we are reminded of the time when we were children eagerly waiting to set it up."

### Pope Francis - "Advent a time to make peace in the soul, family, neighbourhood"

As we get into the second week of Advent, Pope Francis wants us to meditate seriously, how Christians can prepare for Christmas by building peace in one's soul, in the family and in the world through humility. He is urging Christians to prepare themselves for Christmas this Advent season by being humble and trying to build peace in their soul, in their family and in the world. Delivering a homily at Mass, the Pope said that peace-making consists in not talking evil of and harming others, a bit like imitating God, who humbled Himself.

**Isaiah the prophet:** Pointing to the pastoral scene evoked by Isaiah in the first reading, where the wolf and the lamb, and the leopard and the kid live side by side harmlessly, the Pope said the prophet speaks about the peace of Jesus that transforms life and history, which is why He is called the "**Prince of Peace**".

**The soul:** Advent, therefore, is the time to prepare ourselves for this Prince of Peace by being at peace with ourselves, our soul, that is often in anxiety, anguish and without hope. For this, one needs to start with oneself.

Today the Lord asks us whether our soul is at peace? If not, then we should ask the Prince of Peace to pacify our souls, so we can meet Him, because we are so used to looking at the souls of others rather than our own.

**Family;** After being at peace with our soul, it is time to be at peace at home, in the family, the Pope said. There is so much sadness in families with much struggle, "small wars" and at times disunity. Therefore Christians must examine themselves whether they are at peace or at war in their families or against others, whether there are bridges or walls that separate.

**World:** In the world where there is much war, disunity, hatred and exploitation. Christians should ask themselves what they are doing about creating peace in the world by working for peace in the neighbourhood, in the school and in the workplace.

The Pope urged Christians to ask themselves whether they find excuses to make war, to hate, to talk ill about others and condemn or are they meek and try to build bridges.

Children too can ask themselves whether at school they bully a companion they dislike because he is a little hateful or weak, or they make peace and forgive everything.

**Peace-making like God:** Peace, is never still but always moves forward. It starts with the soul, and after making its journey of peace, returns to the soul. Making peace is a bit like imitating God. When He wanted to make peace with us and forgave us, He sent His Son to make peace, to be the Prince of peace. To be a peacemaker one does not have to be wise and learned and study peace. Peace is an attitude that Jesus speaks about in the Gospel. Jesus glorifies God because he has hidden these things from the wise and learned and has revealed them to the little ones.

Christians must make themselves small, humble and be the servant of others. "The Lord will give you the ability to understand how to make peace and will provide you with the strength to make it,".

**Stop short of "small wars":** Whenever there is the possibility of a "small war" at home, in the heart, at school or at work, we should stop short and try and make peace. "Never, never wound the other. Never," As Christians start by not speaking ill of others or firing the first cannon. We become men and women of peace, carrying peace forward.

Choose prayer and charity over consumerism "Resist the dazzling lights of consumption, which will shine everywhere this month, and believe that prayer and charity are not lost time, but the greatest treasures, This is the drama of today: houses full of things, but empty of children.

Pope Francis celebrated an Advent Mass with Congolese immigrants, in which he warned against the selfish attitudes in a society where "consumerism reigns." "Consumerism is a virus that affects the faith at its root because it makes you believe that life depends only on what you have, and so you forget about God," he warned. "The meaning of life is not to accumulate."

"When you live for things, things are never enough, greed grows and others become obstacles in the race and so you end up feeling threatened and, always dissatisfied and angry ... 'I want more, I want more, I want more," he said. "One has many goods, but no good is done."
