A SOLIDARITY BEYOND POLITICS

I am writing this a week before the General Election. When you come to read this the result will have been declared. I can't foresee the future but in the tradition of biblical prophecy I can herald an important truth that is always challenging but not always welcome. The future well-being of our country and indeed of humanity in general will depend on our willingness to co-operate together for the good of all. Factional politics has failed to unite and seems incapable of giving birth to the changes that are needed. We need to embrace a collective identity that transcends all that can divide us.

Christians believe this deeper, unifying identity has been revealed by Jesus Christ. St Paul wrote that Jesus broke down all the dividing walls between human beings. The purpose was not to found another competitive religion but to create a "new humanity". This evolutionary leap forward is not an impersonal,

autonomous process. It is a freely accepted transformation of heart and mind. It is about seeing and relating to others and all things, as God does, in love. For most of us this is a slow, sometimes painful journey of learning & re-learning, maturing out of self-centredness into a more generous and universal compassion.

We all come from God. We are finite sparks of divine light. Our burden is that we can't see, feel, experience or imagine that in ourselves. But many people see the Divine light, the eternal Word, the Christ, in Jesus born in Bethlehem. In Jesus the light of God's love for us shines clearly. And so, in spite of our messy, contradictory lives we are able to believe that we, and indeed the whole of creation, have come from God and are held in God's embrace. CHRISTMAS TREE: The Christmas tree is the most visible and frequent symbol for Christmas. Unfortunately, we don't always give it a religious meaning. The commercial world has appropriated the Christmas tree as if it were simply a symbol of the "holidays" and completely ignore the centrality of the Our Lord's role. While the traditions that each family may use can vary, what's important is that we remember and make it clear that the Christmas tree is a Catholic symbol.

According to Cardinal Giuseppe Bertello, Pope John Paul II brought a Christmas tree to the Vatican in 1982. "The tree, in every culture, is a symbol of life," the cardinal said. A Christmas tree is a reminder that "the Lord comes to give us his life. Let us welcome him in our hearts and, in the glow of its light, let us bring him to the world," he said.

In 2004, Pope John Paul called the Christmas tree *a symbol of Christ*. This very ancient custom, he said, exalts the value of life, as in winter what is evergreen becomes a sign of undying life, and it reminds Christians of the "tree of life" of Genesis 2:9, an image of Christ, the supreme gift of God to humanity.

In the early 700's, Saint Boniface, who converted the German people to Christianity, demolished the Oak of Thor, the mighty sacred tree worshipped by the Saxons. From its roots grew a fir tree which Boniface took as a sign of the Christian faith.

In the 11th century, Paradise plays portrayed the tree of Paradise, decorated with red apples. During the 15th century, the faithful began to erect trees in their homes on December 24, reported to be the feast day of Adam and Eve. About the year 1500, inspired by a snow-covered fir tree, a small tree was brought indoors and decorated with candles in honour of Christ's birth.

Thus, the Christmas tree represents the original Tree of Paradise, the burning bush which spoke to Moses, the branch of Jesse from which Jesus was born, the life-giving tree of the cross of Christ, and the tree which St. John the Apostle saw in the Book of Revelations whose leaves have medicine for the people and which yields fruit each month for the healing of the nations.

Because it is green year-round, the evergreen tree represents hope. Its needles and its narrow crest point upward, turning our thoughts to heaven. Because the tree is cut down and then erected again, it is a symbol of Christ's resurrection. Christmas lights also remind us that we are to be light to others, to show them the way to Christ.

Lord, may I see Christmas trees as a sign of hope and as reminders of the many trees that figure in salvation history. I thank You, Lord, for turning the tree of Adam and Eve's sin into the tree of life through the cross of Christ. Because of Christ who died on the tree, you have given us the promise of eternal life. Amen.

SCHOOL MASS- date for your diary: The next Mass at the school will be on Thursday 9th January at 9am. You are all welcome to attend.

Christmas is filled with symbols, many of which have lost their Christian symbolism in a secular world. Here you will find the Christian meaning of two of our Christmas symbols. The tradition of the church incorporates material symbols because they help us get a better grasp on the spiritual realities that they are representing.

ADVENT WREATH: The Advent Wreath combines the symbolism of wreathes, evergreens and candles. In addition, the Advent wreath utilizes the symbolic colours purple and pink, the colour of the priest's Advent vestments. In an Advent Wreath, three purple candles (to signify penance, prayer, and preparation for Christmas) and one pink candle (to symbolize rejoicing) are spaced equidistantly around the wreath. Each candle represents 1000 years which, taken together, equal the traditional sense of 4000 years from Adam to the birth of Christ. The purple candles are lit on the First, Second, and Fourth Sundays of Advent and the pink one on the Third Sunday, which is called Gaudete (Rejoicing) Sunday. On Christmas Day, a white (for the purity of Christ) candle is lit. The white candle symbolizes the birth of Christ, the Light of the World and the Centre of all creation.

Lord, be my Light in the darkness and help me to be a light to others, to show them the way to you. When all seems hopeless, help me to remember that the darkness cannot overcome Your Light. You are the eternal Brilliance of God. May Your Light be my hope, my God. Amen.
