PASTORAL LETTER AND DECREE FROM THE BISHOP on 19th March 2020, the Solemnity of St. Joseph.

CORONAVIRUS

Dear Faithful and Clergy of the Diocese of Portsmouth,

"I watched Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Yes, I have given you power to tread underfoot serpents and scorpions and the whole strength of the enemy; nothing shall ever hurt you" (Luke 10: 18-19).

The COVID-19 pandemic is causing much harm and concern to us all, both at home and abroad. We do not know why God in His providence has allowed this pandemic to occur. What we do know is that He has given us victory through the death and resurrection of His Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ and poured into human history the power of the Holy Spirit to guide all things in the right direction. This is why, in the words of St. Paul, we know that nothing can come between us and the love of Christ, even if we are troubled or worried, or being persecuted, or lacking food or clothes, or being threatened or even attacked. ... These are the trials by which we triumph by the power of Him who loved us. Indeed, we can be certain that neither death nor life, no angel, no prince, nothing that exists, nothing still to come, not any power or height or depth, nor any created thing can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord (Rom 8: 35-36, 38-39).

As Catholics, we must tackle this crisis with spiritual as well as human resources. Let us work for an end to this scourge. Let us keep our churches open for prayer and offer daily Mass for the Church and the world. Let us proclaim God's Word, administer the Sacraments and offer pastoral care to God's people in their need. Indeed, the ministry of prayer at this time is crucial. Let us pray for a speedy solution, for those who are sick, for the protection of the elderly and the vulnerable, for those in self-isolation, for all who are suffering anxiety and worry, for the homeless and needy, for the well-being and financial security of all, for the NHS medical staff and all who care for the sick, and for the repose of those who have died. In advance, I thank our clergy and parish ministers for their generosity and willingness to minister in new and different ways during this crisis. Let us be inspired by St. Camillus, St. Juliana Falconieri, Bl. Pier Giorgio and the many other saints from Church history - not least by the Lord Himself - who cared for the sick and infected, amidst great personal danger and difficulty.

I attach to this Pastoral Letter a Decree (to be viewed at www.portsmouthdiocese.org.uk) with some new norms that now become particular law for this Diocese of Portsmouth. I add to these a few pastoral guidelines, some spiritual, others practical, to help us all over the days ahead. All these provisions come into place today, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Patron of the Universal Church, and will remain in place until further notification. Lent is a time of penance, prayer and charity: we will remember this Lent and Easter for many years ahead. So let us call on the efficacious prayers and help of St. Joseph. Just as he protected the Infant Jesus, Saviour of the World, and his spouse, the Blessed Virgin Mary, may he help us now, during this time of emergency.

Mother's Day - The Importance of Mothers

Mother's Day is here today, but shrouded by a chilly atmosphere of fear, isolation and "Virus". Thus we must come to the defence of mothers and motherhood although without the atmosphere of proper celebration, this seems odd, given how valued mothers have been throughout human history. Mothers provide invaluable benefits to all, and their work is priceless. As Ann Crittenden wrote in 2001, "The very definition of a mother is selfless service to another". She cites two old sayings in connection with motherhood: A Jewish adage says, "God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers". And an Arabic proverb puts it this way, "The mother is a school; if she is well reared, you are sure to build a nation".

Mother's Day—called Mothering Day in the U.K.—can be traced back to ancient pagan practices, but it has gone through a lot of changes and names to get to what we know today. The history of Mother's Day can be traced back to celebrations of ancient Greece in honour of Rhea, the mother of the gods. During the 1600s, the early Christians in England celebrated a day to honour Mary, the mother of Christ. By a religious order, the holiday was later expanded to include all mothers. Mother's Day occurs in the U.S. once a year on the second Sunday of May, while Mothering Day in the U.K. is celebrated the fourth Sunday of Lent. Traditional ways to celebrate Mother's Day are to take mothers out to dinner and/or honour them with cards, flowers, or candy. Biblically, honouring mothers (and fathers) is commanded by God in both the Old and New Testaments (Deuteronomy 5:16: Ephesians 6:2).

As Christians, we should be fully convinced that we are doing what God wants us to do. If we choose to celebrate Mother's Day and we see nothing wrong with it, then we should celebrate with a clear conscience. If, however, celebrating is against one's conscience, then celebrating is not appropriate. On the other hand, if one does not celebrate Mother's Day or any other holiday for reasons of conscience, that is fine, as long as he/she does not become prideful, looking down on those who do celebrate. As with all issues not specifically addressed in Scripture, we have the freedom to celebrate or not celebrate Mother's Day, according to personal preference.

Please - the doors of the church will remain closed during the celebration of the Mass. This is just a preventing measure to emphasize that all Masses are suspended to the public.

Sacrament of Reconciliation is maintained and available by a phone call, following the recommendations of the Bishop.

Sacraments to the Sick/Housebound Anointing of the Sick is available on request and by arrangement.

We continue with our Charity and Community Welfare for the needy, the poor, the lonely and those dependent on food banks.

<u>DEDICATION OF ENGLAND AS MARY'S</u> <u>DOWRY.</u> With the support of the Bishop's Conference, every Catholic in England is being invited to participate in the public rededication of our country to the Blessed Virgin Mary as Mary's Dowry. This will be by a solemn act on **Sunday 29th March 2020**, the Fifth Sunday of Lent, the Sunday nearest to the Solemnity of the Annunciation. In preparation for this, everyone is encouraged on each of the three days leading up to 29th March to recite once a day a special form of the Angelus, which will be handed out to you, together with the prescribed prayers for the Re-Dedication. A copy of the Decree authorising the Grant of a Plenary Indulgence on the occasion of The Re-Dedication of England to the Most Blessed Virgin Mary can be found on the noticeboard at the back of Church.
