FEAST - HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY & JOSEPH YEAR "B" 27TH DECEMBER 2020

THE CHRISTIAN FAMILY IN OUR WORLD TODAY

In the first years of his pontificate, Pope John Paul II directed his attention to what he perceived to be a critical challenge to the well-being and integrity of human society: the relationship between man and woman and the fruit of their human and sacramental union-marriage. John Paul's Wednesday audiences on what has come to be called his 'theology of the body' were a necessary backdrop and foundation for his teaching on marriage and the family. The importance of this teaching already had been recognized by the bishops at the Second Vatican Council, who in writing the Pastoral Constitution of the Church in the Modern World (which the Bp. Karol Wojtyla who later became Pope John Paul II helped to author), identified marriage and family as the first 'urgent problem area' to be addressed in Part II of the constitution.

The Council Fathers recognized that marriage and family is the foundation of human society. If that foundation fails, society collapses. The response to Pope Paul VI's encyclical on the transmission of human life, Humanae Vitae (1968), was a clear indication that the Church's long-standing teachings in this area were being subject to scrutiny and criticism, even within the Church. Pope John Paul II sought to present a thorough reasoned response to these issues, first, by developing his 'theology of the body', and then by calling a synod to discuss the family. One fruit of this synod is John Paul II's apostolic exhortation on The Role of the Christian Family in the Modern World (Familiaris Consortio)

What is a Christian Family?

What we can definitively say is this: God is the originator of the family and continues to be. The ideal, established at the beginning of humanity, is for one man and one woman to join in a spiritually and physically committed union for a lifetime, conceiving and rearing children (Genesis 1:27–28; 2:18, 21–25; Matt. 19:1-12).

"A Christian family is a group of people who are related to each other through marriage, birth, or adoption and are committed, first and foremost, to the person and work of Jesus Christ, faithfully witnessing to the love, power, and forgiveness of God to a watching world in its unique time and place."

The family is one of the most basic building blocks of society, and one that constantly develops cultural cracks that must be repaired. Christian families, especially, face additional layers of difficulty—the struggles of maintaining unchanging scriptural values in a culturally dynamic world; because of this, Christian families face some serious issues—ones which must be faced and dealt with in order to thrive.

Divorce - Divorce rates have steadily increased over the past few decades, and splitting up is more commonplace and acceptable than ever before—sometimes even applauded. With the shrinking of religious ties, the stigma of divorce has ebbed away, creating a culture where commitment has become only a word. Still, though, divorce is disruptive and messy, and has profound effects on both the involved spouses, and their children. Children of divorced parents have higher rates of delinquency, academic failure, and violation of state laws than children of unbroken homes.

Christ spoke on the topic, saying that "What God has joined together, let no one separate". As a Christian, it's important to remember the commitment inherent to marriage, both when considering marriage, and

when years into it. Remember that we are all human—divorce affects Christian families at almost the same rate as secular ones. Keeping in mind that your spouse is a flawed human being who will sometimes fail alleviates a lot of tension, and keeps us from holding on to unrealistic expectations—especially as Christians.

Anti-Christian Culture - Family is about love, about commitment, and about compromise—it's not about stark individualism. When we put God first, allowing that vertical relationship to inform our horizontal relationships, we are better able to live in a state of humility and service to our loved ones. As we move into an increasingly post-religious society this message of "me first" will only grow stronger. That, combined with increasing moral relativism, work to undermine the very foundations of Christianity. But think of this as an opportunity for your family—an opportunity to shine, to show the world how good God is through the love and unity of your family.

Called to be Different - Christian families are held not only to a different standard than others, but to a higher as God wants it to be. When we recognize this, we can see all issues and face them, employing scriptural principles to overcome them, we become who God wishes us to be, and in doing so, we do the very best we can for our families. God wants us to be happy, and to have a great family life and we should never forget that.
