I ask you to accompany this apostolic journey with your prayers, so it may unfold in the best possible way and bear hoped-for fruits.

This year's Easter Ceremonies?



You may be wondering about the Easter ceremonies this year, with the COVID restrictions easing yet with many aspects of social distancing etc still in operation. Will we need to make adaptations? Thanks be to God this year our churches can be open and the usual Holy Week liturgies can be celebrated – remember 2020?! And thanks too to all our clergy and lay volunteers for their generous and hard work keeping our churches open. So, for Easter 2021, then, there will have to be number of subtle adaptations to the usual arrangements to ensure that things can be done safely with sanitisation, social distancing and other precautions. For instance, on Palm Sunday, instead of the usual procession, one of the other forms of Entrance Rite as recommended by the Roman Missal may need to be used. On Holy Thursday, the (optional) Washing of the Feet will be omitted and the procession to the Altar of Repose will have to be adapted. On Good Friday, there will be an additional prayer during the Solemn Intercessions for the pandemic and the Adoration of the Cross may need to be done differently. Finally, at the Easter Vigil, it will not be possible to gather round the Easter fire so this part of the liturgy will need to be adjusted.

Message for Lent

The Holy Father has just issued his Message for Lent for 2021: click on the link below to read it. In this Message, under the title, "Behold we are going up to Jerusalem", Pope Francis gathers and arranges the lessons of the passion, crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus into a triad of theological virtues: faith, hope and charity, and a triad of Lenten exercises: self-improvement (as in fasting and abstinence), prayer and charity/almsgiving. These two triads are woven together into forming the Pope's message this year; and, as you can see, they are virtues and exercises which Jesus himself lived and handed on to his followers to be lived also: to make them more Christ-like! With his Lenten message, Pope Francis recommends the same virtues and exercises, which Jesus taught his disciples, to us for our Lenten journey to the feast of the resurrection of Jesus at Easter 2021.

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
