What does the Catechism of the Catholic Church teach us about the

Eucharist?

This is the current section featured in the Catechism in a Year - CCC 1322 to 1419. It is well worth meditating upon to remind, or perhaps teach, us of the immense gift we enjoy in this sacrament.

Some thoughts on the immense value of the holy sacrifice we know as the Mass

Saint Thomas Aquinas taught that with the Holy Eucharist, the five senses fail. Only faith can lift the veil and perceive the reality of Christ's presence and sacrifice.

Here are 5 quotes from saints upon which it may be useful to meditate as we prepare to meet Our Lord in the Eucharist today:

- 1. "The angels surround and help the priest when he is celebrating Mass." ~ St. Augustine
- 2. "If we really understood the Mass, we would die of joy." \sim Saint Jean Vianney
- 3. "My Son so loves those who assist at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass that, if it were necessary, He would die for them as many times as they've heard Masses." Our Lady to Blessed Alan.
- 4. "There is nothing so great as the Eucharist. If God had something more precious, He would have given it to us." ~ Saint Jean Vianney
- 5. "It would be easier for the world to survive without the sun than to do without Holy Mass." ~ St. Pio of Pietrelcina

Born and raised in the State of Andhra Pradesh – South East of India and ordained in 1998. He is looking forward to meeting us in the second week of September, some of you may remember Father Innaiah and his Rough Collie while he was in Totton and Lyndhurst (2013 – 2018). Sadly Father Innaiah's handsome Rough Collie dog is not around anymore as he passed on 29th November 2019 after a short illness. Father Innaiah is happy to look after any of your dogs for a day or two while you are away for a short time! Father wishes us all a Glorious British Summer.

From the Bishop's eNews:

Next Tuesday, 11th July, is the Feastday of St. Benedict (480 - 547), the founder of Western monasticism and Patron of Europe. Born of a well-to-do family, Benedict spent his childhood in Nursia with his twin sister, St. Scholastica. He went to Rome to complete his education, but was appalled at the corruption, and eventually he fled the city. He realised he had a call to become a solitary, and so became a hermit in the mountains of Subiaco. To quench the temptations of the flesh, he developed some extreme practices, including rolling naked in thorns. His fame spread, and he was invited to become the abbot of a monastery in Vicovaro, but shortly afterwards the monks soon regretted this when faced with his strict rules, and it is said they tried to poison him. He returned to Subiaco, where he attracted many new followers. He organised them into a community of twelve small monasteries, emphasising prayer and manual labour. The monks as yet had no formal rule, but based their way of life on the example of Benedict himself. In 525, Benedict moved to Monte Cassino, where he demolished the pagan temple and began work on the great abbey that was to become the cradle of western monasticism. It was there, he completed the final version of his famous Rule, incorporating the traditions of some of the Eastern Fathers and his own sober, common sense, emphasising obedience, community life and moderation. The main duties of a Benedictine monk were prayer, reading and manual labour, and the Rule avoids excessive individual asceticism. The Rule proved itself to be a practical and flexible model for monasteries throughout the West. Benedict died at Monte Cassino in 547, traditionally in prayer, supported upright by his brethren before the altar, having received Holy Communion. He was buried at Monte Cassino next to Scholastica. In 1964, Pope St. Paul VI proclaimed him patron saint of Europe.

MASS READINGS FOR THE 14th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Zechariah 9:9-10

The Lord says this:

Rejoice heart and soul, daughter of Zion! Shout with gladness, daughter of Jerusalem! See now, your king comes to you; he is victorious, he is triumphant, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. He will banish chariots from Ephraim and horses from Jerusalem; the bow of war will be banished. He will proclaim peace for the nations. His empire shall stretch from sea to sea, from the River to the ends of the earth.

Responsorial Psalm: I will bless your name for ever, O God my King.

Second Reading: Romans 8:9,11-13

Your interests are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him, and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.
