GOODBYE TO MGR. FR. PETER RYAN: This week we say goodbye to Fr Peter. He has been in retirement in the parish for 23 years. He and his late cousin, Margaret, became friends to many. Peter will be greatly missed. He returns to the Liverpool diocese and will be resident in Southport. We wish Peter every blessing and grace for the future. You are all welcome to join us in Joseph's Place after Mass for cake & refreshments when we will present to Fr Peter our farewell gift.

**Love and Power:** Fr Richard Rohr writes about how we can help mend the breach between the world as it is (power) and the world as it could be (love).

Both love and power are necessary building blocks of God's peaceful realm on earth. Love utterly redefines the nature of power. Power without love is mere brutality (even in the church), and love without power is only the sentimentality of individual lives disconnected from the Whole. The gospel in its fullness holds love and power together, creating new hope and healing for the world.

Power assumes that life is lived from the top down and from the outside in. It draws its strength from elites and enforcement. As such it is efficient, clean, practical, and works well on many short-term goals. The gospel offers us the inefficient, not-so-clean, multi-layered, long-haul way of love. Love is lived much more from the bottom up and from the inside out. It's easy to see why even churches don't believe in it. It does not give ego or institution any sense of control. Often it doesn't even "work."

Perhaps one way of stating the "spiritual emergency" that Christianity faces is that many clergy and church membership were trained from the top down and the outside in. Love was the message, but power/control was the method. Holiness was in great part defined as respect for outer mediating structures: the authorities that "knew," the rituals that were automatic, the laws that kept you if you kept them, the Tradition that was supposed to be the unbroken consensus of many centuries and cultures. I am convinced that the best top-down Christianity can do is get us off to a good start and keep us inside the ballpark, which isn't bad! But it is not close to satisfactory for the great struggles of faith that people today face in family, morality, and society.

The very depth and truth of the gospel has led people to a more daring and necessary conclusion: Human life is best lived from the inside out and the bottom up. Now love is both the message and the method. Somehow our experiences, our mistakes, our dead ends are not abhorrent to God but the very stuff of salvation. There is no other way to make sense of the Bible or of every human life. Are we secure enough now to admit that there is just as much truth, maybe even more, inside our own journeys and for those living on the margins? So-called "tax collectors and prostitutes are making their way into the kingdom of God before you" (Matthew 21:31). Mature Christianity is perhaps when the inside meets the outside and the bottom is allowed to teach the top. Authentic power is the ability to act from the fullness of who I am, the capacity to establish and maintain a relationship with people and things, and the freedom to give myself away. Sounds like pure gospel to me.

SCHOOL NEWS: Zambia Update: Our children were absolutely thrilled to receive letters this week from their pen pals in Zambia! Governor Roger Maughan brought the letters back after completing his charity bike ride from Zambia to Botswana. Roger visited Eneless Patmos School in Lusaka as part of his work for the charity to tell them that our partnership has raised more than £1000 through our "Zumba for Zambia" initiative. The school were overwhelmed by our efforts and will be using the proceeds to buy musical instruments, in the hope that this will attract more children to education. Many children who are orphans and from the streets attend Eneless Patmos School of their own accord (as it is a charity school) for a free education to better their employment prospects. Our children have loved seeing photos from their counterparts in Zambia and learning about life in Lusaka and can't wait to write back! Many thanks all for your continued support.

JO CLARKE - AUTHOR: We had a very special visitor at Our Lady & St Joseph today, none other than Jo Clarke - author of the detective series "The Travelling School Mysteries!" Her books are set in a school that travels the world! Jo told us all about her books, "Libby and the Parisian Puzzle" and "Libby and the Highland Heist" which we have been reading in school! Each class in Key Stage 2 has a copy of the book and it can also be found in our school library! Jo explained that she is a librarian in a primary school and what an important role this is, and why school libraries are so important. We are very lucky to have such a well stocked library bus at OLSJ and our fantastic reading ambassadors in Year 6 who look after it. Jo told us that she had many rejections on the way to publication, but she kept persevering and showing a great growth mindset, leading her to be offered an agent and a publisher in the same week! She explained how the editing process is so important when writing a book - this is something we do on our writing journey too. She shared that she loved the books Malory Towers and the Famous Five growing up and that detectives, mystery stories and boarding school stories were her favourite. She wanted to add a twist in her books, allowing children to explore the world through literature, hence her books are set in Paris, Scotland and now Manhattan! Jo shared that it is very important to do your research when using a real setting in a book - so she had to visit Paris lots to research the city! When writing Libby and the Highland Heist, she had a trip aboard the Caledonian sleeper! What a great idea, to combine a trip with research! Jo also talked about the role her illustrator plays in the production of her books. She showed images of how her illustrations of the title character Libby were refined and changed, and also how the front cover was adapted following her feedback. Jo also worked with Year 6 in a special writing workshop and shared her tips on how to write an amazing 'heist' story! She very kindly signed copies of her books for pupils too. Thank you so much Jo for a fabulous visit - we are all feeling very inspired as both authors and illustrators, and we very much love your books!
