THANK YOU, EVERYONE FOR SUCH KIND AND GENEROUS GIFTS AND CHRISTMAS OFFERINGS: Some of you give very generously but wish to remain anonymous. Others do so with a card and a gift as well. My heartfelt thanks to you all. I had every intention of giving a personal thankyou if it was possible. But work has come flooding in at the start of the new year. So please forgive me if I fail to achieve this and be assured of my deep gratitude to you and my prayers for you all.

WHAT ARE WE OFFERING THE WORLD? Traditionally the Epiphany is the manifestation, the revelation of Christ to the pagan world. If Christianity is to play its part in making known the Christ to the world it must be continually renewed and enlightened by the same Christ. Individually and collectively we are "earthen vessels" that hold a treasure. Our ignorance, prejudices & vested interests can distort the good news. Sometimes this distortion is such that, albeit, unwittingly, we communicate, or are perceived to communicate bad news instead. When it comes to offering Christ's life to the world we are "wounded healers". This only becomes an obstacle when we refuse to recognise & acknowledge the "wound" or the "shadow".

The most fundamental obstacle to the "good news" is the failure to exorcise the demonic image of God as an eternal torturer. The threat of eternal damnation became an all too easy weapon of abuse, control and domination. Coupled with countless examples of barbarity over the centuries it is a miracle that the emphatic Scriptural affirmation "God is love" retained any credibility at all. For Christianity to be good news for the whole world the dark shadow of fear and threat must be dispelled. All we need is a realistic recognition of consequences.

Secondly, Christianity must bring out from its storehouse of wisdom the healing and unifying dynamism of the Word. Now is the opportune time to proclaim that: "God is in all, through all and with all", that: "in God we live and move and have our being", that God's purpose is to "reconcile and unite all things, in heaven and on earth". This is particularly relevant to the relationship between faith & science.

Thirdly, Christianity must present itself not as the promoter of one religion in competition with others, but as the guardian and seed bed of a "new humanity". Everything that causes hostility must be "abolished". Humanity doesn't exist for religion, religion exists, should exist, for humanity. The simple, yet all encompassing axiom, too often obscured by human rules & taboos, that can give light to everyone is: "No one has ever seen God, as long as we love one another, God will live in us and his love will be complete in us".

Fourthly, Christianity must be healed of, and recover from, its gender and sexual neurosis which blighted the most basic human relationships with fear, shame & guilt. The wholesome and divinely transformative potential of ordinary human relationships must be clearly celebrated and communicated. Jesus offers friendship as the ultimate goal of all relationships, both human & divine.

Fifthly, there needs to be a healthy relativisation of all identities, forms and structures. When these are allowed to be absolutes, then the tyranny of earthly "gods" & "idols" ensues. Here we need to proclaim: "there is no male or female, no slave or free, no Jew or Greek, you are all one in Christ Jesus". This is not a denial of diversity but a recognition that the diversity is held and is secondary to an all-encompassing unity. Respecting diversity and transcending diversity are both necessary for future global harmony. (DMA)

OLSJ SCHOOL NEWS: TWO EXCITING COMPETITIONS TO START THE SCHOOL YEAR! OUR CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL IS TAKING PART IN THE NATIONALK READING CHAMPIONS QUIZ!
